DO THE "WRITE" THING!

STUDY SUGGESTIONS

Here are some suggested study methods to help you spend with God's Word each day. Feel free to use any of these, or choose one that works better for you. The best study method is the one you'll use daily!

Option 1: Pocket method

Write the verses on a post it note or index card and carry it in your pocket. Pull it out and read it multiple times during the day.

Option 2: Devotional study

Write the verses on a card or in a journal and take a moment to pray about what God is saying in this passage and reflect on how it applies to you. Try using the SPECK method of application:

1. **Sin** - Is there a sin I need to confess or avoid?
2. **Promise** - Is there a promise of God in this passage?
3. **Example** - Is there a role model in this passage?
4. **Command** - Is there a command to obey?
5. **Knowledge** - What knowledge do I gain about God?

As you answer the questions, write down a few thoughts in your journal or on the back of the card.

Option 3: In Depth method

Write the verses at the top of a sheet of paper in a journal. Answer the following questions about the passage:

1. Who wrote this passage and to whom was it written?
2. What is the theme of the book or section?
3. What are some key words in the passage and what do they mean? You may want to consult a lexicon or Bible dictionary.
4. What are some ways this passage would have challenged the first readers? How does it challenge Christians today?
5. For application purposes, consider using the SPECK method from Option 2.
